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Daubie and Donna Daubenberger exemplify active, joyful life

There are a lot of great smiles to be seen among those active in Habitat for Humanity of East Jefferson County - two of those

great smiles belong to Jim "Daubie" Daubenberger and Donna Daubenberger. Daubie and Donna had supported Habitat for

Humanity International for years financially when they heard about an opportunity for Habitat Gypsies – the former name for Care-A-Vanners -- to serve in Central Washington. In the early 1990s, they packed their RV and headed to the Yakima Valley Partners Habitat for Humanity and spent two weeks helping that affiliate build houses.

When local citizens held meetings to start an East Jefferson County affiliate, Daubie and Donna were there. Daubie went on to join a core group of six or seven men who worked with homeowner Christie Apker to erect the envelope for the affiliate's first house. Daubie is proud to say they did it in about two weeks in the middle of winter. The home was completed and dedicated in spring 1999. The late Al Raber led that effort and Daubie is quick to pass the credit on to Al for the success of the build. "He really put himself out."

Eventually Daubie "gave up the housing business" and moved to the "furniture business," helping Richard Spindor and Jim Kerns, among others, pick up donations for the fledgling Furniture and More Store in its early days. He's been a

steady "pick-up guy" ever since.

Not long afterward, Donna took on a regular Tuesday shift at the store, assisting with sorting, cleaning, and pricing items as they arrive. "I like to see what comes in," said Donna. Both she and Daubie enjoy the time they spend with Habitat. "I enjoy working with the people we work with," said Daubie.

Port Townsend roots

Daubie's mother was born in Port Townsend and his family returned when he was 12. Donna moved as an infant to Port Townsend, where her father and mother ran the Verrier Mart, located on the present site of the Habitat store. The family added an apartment upstairs, where Donna lived when she was little, and which is now the

home of the Habitat office. After Daubie and Donna married, they ran businesses in Port Townsend from 1947 to

1990, including Daubie's, a clothing store.

The Daubenberger's daughter Jana Filli serves on the Habitat Board of Directors and as Chair of the Family Selection Committee. When asked if they pushed Jana to help with Habitat, Donna said, "Oh, no, she did it on her own." But if you know Jana, it's obvious in her great smile that she has had two good examples to follow.

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PT residents aid Jimmy & Rosalynn Carter Work Project

Local volunteers respond to ongoing Gulf needs

Diane Roberts and Val Johnstone of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Port Townsend, recently returned from a week at the Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter Habitat for Humanity Gulf Coast Work Project. Their site was at Diamondhead, a community 25 minutes north of our sister city of Bay St Louis, where 300 volunteers built 10 houses in five days. Other sites in the project included Biloxi and Gulfport, Mississippi.

Carters visit each house

The highlight of the trip was a visit by the Carters to each house to meet the homeowner and have a picture taken with

the whole crew. Despite thunder, lightning and pouring rain the night before and right up to

an hour before the visit, we were photographed outdoors on the front porch.

Diane, an experienced house painter, was put in charge of the painting crew, and Val, inexpe-

rienced at everything, did her best at painting and cleaning up. We stayed at the Langniappe Presbyterian Church in Bay St. Louis – an amazingly efficient organization that provides food and shelter for volunteers helping with the Katrina

VISTA Americorps volunteers mass on the Gulf

In mid-May I had the honor of attending the 25th Annual Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter Work Project on the Gulf Coast. It was a truly amazing experience to serve along with thousands of other Habitat volunteers from around the country and around the world in rebuilding the areas devastated by the 2005 hurricane season.

Habitat tackles rehab

I was assigned to a house in the Forrest Heights neighborhood of Gulfport, where 30 homes were being rehabilitated. When we arrived the houses had already been gutted, rewired and sheet rocked, so our work included painting, laying flooring, installing cabinets, hanging doors, replacing windows, and installing

trim.

Most of the volunteers with whom I shared meals, work, and bus rides were other VISTA (Volunteers in Service to America) and Americorps members serving with Habitat affiliates across the country. It was a great chance to meet people and share stories. Our common experience as Habitat Americorps members meant there was always lots to talk about. and the differences in the places we were from, the size

of our affiliates, and the kind of work we did made the conversations interesting.

An incredible amount of

work was accomplished in very short time through many, many people coming together.

There is still much. much more work to be done -- on the Gulf Coast, in disaster areas around the world, and in our own communities. I strongly encourage anyone who can to get involved, whether by traveling to South East Asia for next year's Carter Work Project, helping with the continued efforts to rebuild the Gulf Coast,

or lending your time right here at home. It is more than worth it!


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Family Selection: joy and challenge

Each prospective family receives a home visit from two committee members before the final selection in April.
